I am a McCracken County resident writing to ask that call for an independent, cumulative environmental and economic impact assessment before any further permits or public funds are committed to the GLE uranium enrichment project and all associated development on and adjacent to the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant Superfund site in McCracken County.

My request is straightforward: no further approvals should move forward until a truly independent, cumulative environmental and economic impact assessment has been conducted — one that evaluates all current and proposed projects together, not separately.

No agency is currently required to do this. That gap is a serious problem, and it should be addressed before decisions are made that cannot be undone.
